Town of Athabasca 2025 Municipal Election

Nominations Open: Jan. 1, until Sept. 22, 2025, at 12:00 p.m.

Municipal Elections are conducted every four years, under the provision of the Local Authorities Election Act. The Town of Athabasca's next general election is scheduled to take place Monday, October 20, 2025. Town residents will elect one Mayor and six Councillors to serve a four-year term.

This article is a summary of election details. Complete details, including a Nomination Checklist and a link to the <u>2025 Municipal</u> <u>Election Candidate Information Package</u>, can be found on the <u>2025</u> <u>Municipal Election page</u> of the Town website.

Nominator Eligibility

For a candidate's nomination to be valid, the candidate must complete the prescribed Nomination Paper and have five eligible voters sign the Nomination Paper. The candidate is encouraged to seek more than five in case a nominator becomes disqualified.

Nominators must be:

- (a) eligible to vote in this election, and
- (b) residents of the Town of Athabasca on the date they signed the form

Candidate Eligibility

Candidates must be:

- (a) eligible to vote in this election,
- (b) a resident of the Town of Athabasca for the six consecutive months immediately preceding nomination day, and
- (c) not otherwise ineligible or disqualified.

A person is **not eligible** to be nominated for more than one office.

Please note: It is the candidate's responsibility to ensure that they comply with the laws governing elections and to obtain any necessary legal advice. The Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA) and the Municipal Government Act (MGA) can be accessed through the Alberta King's Printer. Dr. Josephine M. Brown Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship is an award of excellence in honour of Dr. Josephine M. Brown, a long-time resident of Athabasca and her many years of service, both as a physician and a Town Councillor. This scholarship is an annual award acknowledging academic excellence and achievement. One scholarship in the amount of \$2,000 is awarded per calendar year.

The scholarship is open to all current Grade 12 students or past graduates that attended Edwin Parr Composite High School in Athabasca and intend to continue their post-secondary education in the medical field at an accredited two or four-year college or university, vocational school, or technical training program.

Community Grants Available

Did you know that grant funding for community projects is available from the Town of Athabasca? The fund is limited, with a total of \$3,250.00 being allocated to the 2025 budget. Funding is based on a maximum grant of \$500 per individual or group.

Grant applications will be reviewed by a committee. Grants will be awarded to qualified applicants until the fund limit has been reached. Eligible applicants may apply for funding in advance of, or up to thirty days after the event, provided the application is received within the same calendar year.

The purpose of the <u>Town of Athabasca Community Grant</u> is to provide financial assistance to individuals, groups, and not-forprofit organizations that partake in events that benefit the community, for example, sports and cultural activities. Eligible applicants are limited to one community grant per calendar year. Recipients will be asked to provide a report after the event, as we would like to share the successes and thank our community groups for their contributions to the wellbeing of residents and visitors! Casino Fundraisers: A Collaboration

Community groups throughout Alberta are taking advantage of a unique fundraising opportunity by providing volunteer labour at a casino in their region. Interested groups must apply to <u>Alberta</u> <u>Gaming, Liquor & Cannabis (AGLC)</u> for a casino license.

Some groups find it challenging to round up the required number of volunteers, and this creates an opportunity for local groups to help each other by sharing their volunteer labour base. Funds raised through this effort can be applied towards community enhancement projects and building community capacity.

Eco-Friendly, Sustainable Landscaping

Planting drought tolerant and fire-resistant plants creates an ecofriendly and sustainable landscape for your home. There are many benefits to planting drought tolerant plants: water conservation, cost and time savings, extending infrastructure lifespans, reducing chemical needs, and decreasing energy use and pollution.

The following are examples of drought tolerant perennials, shrubs, and trees that are well suited for Alberta's climate:

Rural Food Production with Passive Solar Greenhouses

<u>Athabasca Grown</u> is the working name for the Small Community Opportunity Program project "*Rural Food Production with Passive Solar Greenhouses*", being co-led by Dr. Mike Gismondi and Athabasca University (AU) researcher Cara Shan. The project has the support of the Town of Athabasca, AU Architecture professor Veronica Madonna, AU student research assistants, and a team of Alberta-based food and agriculture consultants and communication professionals.

The project will conduct a comprehensive feasibility assessment for a passive solar greenhouse business for food production in Athabasca, which will become a resource available to rural communities across the province. The assessment will be created alongside <u>workshops</u> that will share knowledge and skills related to small-scale agriculture innovation and build capacity to execute greenhouse and indoor farming business strategies. The workshops will include expert-led presentations and interactive discussions.

"As part of this study, we're also conducting a series of interviews with local retailers, residents, and food service providers to assess the current state of the regional food system, people's perceptions of and interactions with local food, and the possible challenges and opportunities that may be encountered by a new greenhouse business," notes researcher Cara.

The passive solar greenhouse concept could extend Northern Alberta's growing seasons for local food production, even into the winter.

The Athabasca Grown research team will examine the overall benefits, including regenerative production, agrotourism, job creation, community economic development, and more.

The workshop series will explore these subjects further, facilitated by industry experts and practitioners, to engage the community and build local capacity. The workshops are funded through the Government of Alberta's <u>Small Community</u> <u>Opportunity Program</u>. Community Futures Tawatinaw, Athabasca District Agricultural Society, Athabasca University RAIC Centre for Architecture, Athabasca Science Outreach, and Athabasca County Economic Development are co-hosting the events.
